Work related learning day

One of the most popular days in school is Work Related Learning Day where students in Years 7 to 10, and in Year 12, participate in a wide range of activities designed to prepare them for the world of work.

In the Soap Enterprise Challenge Year 10 teams created, manufactured and marketed a soap brand. The challenge sees students creating innovative, fun products and giving lively presentations to launch their sweet smelling soaps to classmates.

Year 7 students enjoyed mindfulness, smoothie making, art for wellbeing and Duke of Edinburgh style challenges. They also took part in sporting activities including table tennis, football fitness, boxing and frisbee.

Year 8 loved their STEM activities which included launching rockets on the school field, meeting rabbits (including some giant ones) and exotic animals, practising medical procedures and spending time in an inflatable planetarium. We are grateful to organisations including Network Rail, The Open University, Wonderstruck, Teaching Talons, Honey's Haven and Medical Mavericks for providing such fantastic experiences.

Year 9 had a Steps into Work Day and did fun team challenges where they built towers with newspapers, had 'find your job' workshops and took part in virtual career workouts with employers. Years 7, 8 and 9 enjoyed taking part in their Days of Recollection in the Maureen Grant Room. Each tutor group spends the day with their form, tutors and Pastoral Leader. Mrs Hoskins, Senior Chaplaincy and Pastoral Leader, said: "Days of Recollection are a valuable way for pupils to explore their spirituality, whilst bonding with their classmates and tutors."

Each Year Group's days had different themes. For example the theme of Year 7's day was getting to know each other better and learning about St Paul. They learnt about the communities they are part of and how to be a considerate, compassionate and courteous member of the St Paul's community.

Year 8 explored the theme of charity and looked at what charity means, the role of charities in society and the barriers that charities might face. As part of their discussions they also learnt more about the work of Catholic charity, CAFOD around the world. During Days of Recollection pupils also take part in fun games where they learn the value of team work and communication.







Black History Month Competition

MK Breakers guide Year 10 boys

Year 10 boys experienced a personal development session with six members of MK Breakers Basketball Club. The session aimed to raise aspirations and encouraged students to challenge the stereotypical views surrounding masculinity.

Students were engaging in real life conversations and were challenged on their actions in particular situations. Mrs Beddow-Patel, who organised the session, said: "Our students were exceptionally forthcoming about sharing their truths and their struggles with the players and coaches and took on board advice to support them finding success in the future."

The session was followed up with a trip to watch MK Breakers play and the players and coaches came back during Pentecost term to check in with the students.

The contestants then created a community themed piece of art. Although his journey ended here, Jaden was delighted to be a part of the show and enjoyed the whole filming experience. He said: "I wasn't expecting to get to the semi-final, I was surprised and excited."

Year 7 experience London theatre

They learnt some fascinating facts about the Globe's history from when it first opened in 1599, how it was destroyed by fire in 1613 and subsequently rebuilt until it closed again in 1642.

It was a fascinating day for Year 7 and helped bring their studies to life in preparation for studying the plays of William Shakespeare. Year 7 also had a fun visit to watch The Lion King at the Lyceum Theatre. For some of our students it was the first time they had seen a live theatre performance so excitement levels were high and we returned home with coach loads of tired but very happy children.
