


Sixth Form Annual


Alice Richardson, who has gained As in Chemistry, History and Mathematics. Alice is going to study Politics, Philosophy and Economics at the University of Warwick.

In January a group of Year 12 students spent the day together in Oxford with Mrs Albone. They started the day with a tour of the Western Bodleian library where they saw many ancient books, conservation work and an Oxford University seminar on the History of Diplomacy taking place. They then had an interactive session in the Tutankhamun: Excavating the Archive exhibition which was fascinating.



Following this the students walked to Trinity College where they had tours of the college, sessions introducing the students to the university admissions process and question and answer sessions with undergraduate students.

Two former St Paul's students also joined them for part of the day, Sarafina who is studying Medicine and Isobel who is studying Spanish at Oxford, and were very helpful in answering questions. The group was also treated to lunch in Trinity College (although sadly their beautiful medieval dining hall was closed for renovation!).

Joanna shares her experience of Swansea University



Former St Paul's student. Joanna Wnekowicz, came to speak to the Year 12 politics students about her experience at Swansea University. Joanna is currently studying International Relations and American Studies.

She shared advice with the students about how to be successful and get involved at university from the beginning. Joanna appreciatively spoke about how her education in A level Politics and GCSE History at St. Paul's has influenced her to now pursue a career in diplomacy.

Joanna also spoke about joining the American Society at Swansea and how they travelled to eight American states. She told the students how what they are learning in Politics plays out in America as she was even able to visit the Georgia State Senate and witness a filibuster on the Senate floor. Ms Markatos and Mr Woodward are so incredibly proud of her and are very pleased that she came back to St Paul's to encourage and share her experience with our students. We know that she will be successful and wish her the very best in the future.

EPQ students explore fascinating subjects

The EPQ gives students the opportunity to explore a fascinating range of subjects alongside their A levels and this year was no exception.

Ellis Ocano, who plans to study Biomedical Engineering at university, chose to do an EPQ on 3D printing a prosthetic limb. For her research Ellis was fortunate to meet twice with Professor Kawal Rhode, Professor in Biomechanical Engineering at King's College London, and was able to do a trial print of her prosthetic limb there.

She also spoke to an amputee

about the physical and psychological aspects of wearing a prosthetic limb, gaining a very useful insight into the subject. Ellis found that having to combine a lot of difficult information to understand her research helped put her ahead for university. She also felt that having to meet tough deadlines proved to be good discipline for time management.

For Lola Amner, who wants to study Operation Department Practice (organising and running surgeries), her chosen EPQ topic psychosocial predicts was very useful when it came to her university interviews and helping her to think about a career in medicine. She enjoyed doing online research, reading a book by renowned psychoanalyst Erik Erikson and taking on the challenge of writing her 5000 word essay.

Nikola Szymanska hopes to study Criminology at university and her EPQ meant that she could choose a topic that really informed her future studies and ultimate career dream of being a solicitor or barrister.

Her EPQ subject was Madeleine McCann and she looked into the many different, often controversial, theories surrounding Madeleine's disappearance. Her research included reading Kate McCann's book as she wanted to understand the mother's viewpoint and to find out about the family dynamic. She read many historic articles and found they were based on hearsay and speculation rather than fact. At first Nikola found writing the 5000 word essay daunting but she just wanted to keep writing and, in the end, had to edit and cut down her piece. Nikola felt the essay prepared her for her dissertation and she found it good practice and helpful for university.
